### Park Improvements

### The following is a partial list of the work completed in 2012.

#### CASCADE VALLEY METRO PARK | Akron 44313

 Upgraded the Chuckery Area restroom to a fourseason facility, and resurfaced the Overlook and Schumacher trails

#### FIRESTONE METRO PARK | Akron 44319

· Installed a new restroom building in the Tuscara-



was Meadows Area, completed roofing and flooring work on Coventry Oaks Pavilion, and replaced 800 linear feet of boardwalk on Redwing Trail

#### FURNACE RUN METRO PARK | Richfield 44286

 Renovated the restrooms in Brushwood Pavilion and completed stream and shoreline restorations

#### **GOODYEAR HEIGHTS METRO PARK** | Akron 44305

 Installed a new restroom building at the northwest lot off Newton Street

#### LIBERTY PARK | Twinsburg 44087

 Added 1,550 linear feet of boardwalk to Buttonbush Trail, and installed bat gates on two off-trail caves to prevent the spread of white-nose syndrome, which is killing bats by the millions nationwide

#### F.A. SEIBERLING NATURE REALM | Akron 44313

 Repaired the abutments for the suspension bridge, and installed walkway lights between the visitors center and the campfire area

#### SAND RUN METRO PARK | Akron 44313

 Resurfaced most of the six-mile Jogging Trail and completed major stream-bank and culvert repairs

#### SILVER CREEK METRO PARK | Norton 44203

• Constructed two new reservable shelters near the swim lake, repaved 1.4 miles of the parkway



and completed the restoration of the Civil War-era Harter Barn

#### SPRINGFIELD BOG METRO PARK |

Springfield Twp. 44312

 Installed a new restroom building, information kiosk and trailhead sign

#### **MULTIPURPOSE TRAILS**

#### BIKE & HIKE TRAIL | 34 miles

 A new bridge over I-271 completed the off-road realignment of the trail in Sagamore Hills, and new



concrete decks were placed on three existing bridges in Hudson and Stow.

#### FREEDOM TRAIL | Currently 4.2 miles

 Completed Phase 1, between Tallmadge Circle and Middlebury Road, for this new eight-mile multipurpose trail that will connect Akron and Kent

### OHIO & ERIE CANAL TOWPATH TRAIL | 22.4 of 41 miles

in Summit County

 Opened the final Summit County section of the trail in Barberton, and resurfaced nearly two miles of the trail elsewhere in the county



#### DISTRICT-WIDE

#### **Boundary Surveys**

 Part of a multi-year project, surveys of park boundaries were conducted for existing and yet-to-open Metro Parks.

#### Bridge Inspections

 Annually, inspections are conducted on our more than 150 bridges. Roadway bridge inspections are completed in cooperation with the Summit County Engineer's Office.

### Programs & Events

#### **EDUCATION**

Naturalists led 838 programs, teaching 28,309 visitors of all ages about environmental education, recreational activities and the park district's natural and cul-

tural history. Scouts earned badges and students met Ohio's science standards through experiential learning in an outdoor setting.

More than 65,000 visitors learned about nature with educational exhibits, native live animals, events and naturalist interactions at F.A. Seiberling Nature Realm.



#### SPECIAL EVENTS

#### Spree For All

An estimated 10,000 visitors enjoyed flat, easy **FORALL** trails during this award-winning annual hiking series for people of all ages, health levels and physical abilities. More than 2,000 rewards were earned.

#### Fall Hiking Spree

An estimated 50,000 hikers experienced Summit **SPREE**County's breathtaking fall foliage while hitting the trails during this annual hiking series. More than 12,000 hiking shields were awarded.

#### Fall Family Outings

Thousands of families enjoyed free hayrides, natu- **outings** ralist-led activities, live music, cider, popcorn, cookies and more at Goodyear Heights and Silver Creek.

### Resource Management

#### MASS PLANTINGS

 Nearly 1,200 trees and shrubs were planted in the Tallmadge Meadows Area in Munroe Falls Metro Park, and almost 2,400 shrubs in Furnace Run Metro Park.

#### CONTROLLED BURNS

 Prescribed fires were used to help control invasive species at F.A. Seiberling Nature Realm and Springfield Bog Metro Park.

#### STREAM RESTORATION

 In Furnace Run Metro Park, the restoration of the main stem of Furnace Run was completed, and restoration work continued on Pond Brook in Liberty Park.

## Safety & Security

- Rangers tallied 9,700 hours of foot patrols and 555 hours of bicycle patrols, resulting in more than 60,000 contacts with visitors.
- The Bike Patrol, which consists of more than 70 volunteers, rode the Bike & Hike and Towpath trails to offer assistance to visitors.
- Thirty-five lifeguards kept watch during the swim season at Munroe Falls Metro Park and Silver Creek Metro Park.

#### Volunteers

Annually, 700-plus volunteers give more than 36,000 service hours. Roles include support of customer service, resource management, interpretation, rangers, operations and more.
